Words from Pastor

Many people picture the perfect family dinner like this: A family of four, mom, dad, a son, and a daughter, gathering around a perfectly set dinner table. The table itself is long and rectangular. A white, freshly laundered and bleached table cloth drapes over the top with beautiful pleats on the corners. The settings are perfectly set with knife, fork, and spoon gently laid on top of a folded napkin that perfectly matches the cloth underneath it. The cutlery is silver and the dinnerware is fine china embossed with intricate hand-painted designs. Two candles flicker a soft glow in the center of the table on either side of a roast meat. Side dishes of vegetables are arranged strategically to be passed around in a clockwise fashion. Father sits at the head of the table in a pressed white shirt and tie. He is cheerfully listening to the tales of the day shared by mother on the other end of the table in fine summer dress and pearls. The boy and girl sit quietly enjoying their peas while the grownups talk.

The reality of the situation is that this image is rarely accurate. For one, the fine china has been tightly locked away since my parents received it in 1975. While desperately awaiting the presence of Queen so that they can finally be of use! Neither has my mother ever worn a summer dress, house dress, or any dress that I can remember, and pearls to the dinner table. Yet this is the image that many people have of what a family dinner should look like.

I mention this because I have read many articles decrying the end of the family dinner. Fast food and other types of restaurants have displaced the family table. To the point where many new homes have repurposed the classic dining room in favor of counter top bar seating and TV dinner trays in front of the silver screen. However, I am not sure that this is a new phenomenon. The first TV dinner sold for \$.98 in 1954. Since then, dinner and screens have gone hand in hand.

A child with an iPhone, Kindle, iPad, Nintendo Switch, or some other form of hand held entertainment device at the dinner table is not new. I suspect it is a tale as old as at least the radio if not even the toy dolly. And yet, we decry the most modern of technology as the source of the problem. The problem being that the family dinner is a dying, if not already dead, family tradition. I tell you the problem is not with technology. It is with our ability communicate, specifically, our ability to communicate inter-generationally.

When I was growing up, I was told by many adults that "ain't" ain't a word or that "that's sick" was not indeed a good thing. Now I find my role reversed as I say to my kids, "I'm not sure you know what 'sigma' means" when they have said to me "What the sigma?" Slang changes with generations. It seems to change far more quickly these days with the ease of the internet, but it is just one of the many challenges that arises in communication. (Colloquial dialects pose the same problem. Although, I was immediately told what a "Yinzer" was, it has taken me four years to figure out what gumband, buggy, and slippy meant.) Slang, although a barrier, is not the primary problem with familial communication. I have noticed a trend. When I was younger, (and my parents have shared similar stories from their childhoods) noisy children were sent outside to play. Hence the Facebook meme, "when I was kid the streetlights told me when I had to be home." Being outside didn't feel like a punishment because it was fun. It wasn't a punishment per se, but it was intended to give parents a time of quiet. Newer generations with children have adapted the move by giving their noisy child a screen instead. It serves the same purpose, providing a time of quiet. Is this a good thing? Probably not. The reason being is that both practices discourage intergenerational communication.

The Bible is clear that the older generations (i.e. parents and grandparents, aunts and uncles), are tasked with teaching the younger generations the ways of the God. Deuteronomy 6:4-9 says,

"Hear of Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise."

God teaches us that we should be talking to our children and grandchildren and nieces and nephews often about God and His Word. This is emphasized by Saint Paul in 2 Timothy 1:5 when he says to Timothy "I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that dwelt in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, dwells in you." Paul takes this moment to subtly emphasize the importance of intergenerational communication, specifically, intergenerational faith conversations. These conversations are so important. A child first learns how to talk from a parent who speaks to it. It learns social cues from adults who engage with it with appropriate social behaviors. They learn all kinds of valuable information from an older generation that passes down stories and learned lessons to the next. The same is true with faith. Saint Paul promises us that faith comes from hearing the Word (Romans 10:17). It does not come passively to the person, but God has sent a missionary (you) to share the Word with the next generation (your children). It is through the sharing of the Word that God creates faith in the heart of all of His children. He even gives us a promise. He promises that if we train a child up in the faith that when they are old they will not depart from it (Proverbs 22:6). This faith leads us all to eternal life. Your family dinners don't need to be perfect. They don't need to be quiet. As a matter of fact, they should be far from quiet. The adults at the table should set the example. Engage the children in conversation. Ask them about their day. Find out their interests and seek to learn about them. By asking you will teach the next generation to live with the same level of curiosity about others. You will teach them to ask the similar questions. It won't be long until they are asking questions about you. To those questions, you will get to respond with answers of faith. Thereby you will be teaching your children and grandchildren all about Jesus. These conversations don't need a dinner table. They can even be had in front of or even through a screen. All it will take is a little bit of courage on your part to ask that first question.

Elder's Corner

When we came to this area from lowa in 1981, we struggled. I was an instructor at a community college in Sheldon, lowa and took a 65% pay increase, better benefits, relocation costs, and expenses to move here and work for Westinghouse as an instructor for Nuclear Instrumentation. We were struggling and couldn't get ahead. We couldn't find a house to purchase and ended with a money pit. We were the only people that went to the movie "The Money Pit" and cried. Every week it seemed like some new catastrophe fell on our heads. We actually considered moving back to lowa. But brighter heads prevailed, and we adopted this saying "So, you want to go back to Egypt?" When one of us got discouraged, the other would ask that question and we would stop, reconsider, and keep moving on. Just like the Israelites, we couldn't go back, going back would have been worse than staying here.

That time of struggling was God changing us from doing it our way to doing it His way. We did not have a good relationship with God at that time and it took him a number of years to get us set onto His pathways. Some times

the lessons are difficult.

At some point we all get that feeling that I want to go back to the way it was. The biggest complaint I hear now is "I want to go back to the way it was before COVID." That is not going to happen. We can't go back. Even the disciples suffered from this malady. Back in Luke 5 Jesus is on the shore and Peter has career as a fisherman and has been fishing all night and has no fish to show for his efforts. He comes to shore, and Jesus borrows his boat to use as a platform to speak from. When Jesus is finished, he tells Peter to go deep and cast his nets. Peter does and fills his nets to breaking and fills two boats with fish. Peter is called to be a fisher of men and leaves everything to follow Jesus.

Fast forward to John 21.1t is three and a half years later and Jesus has been crucified, resurrected, and the disciples are lost without Jesus. Peter, the default leader, is lost and decides he wants to go back to his former career of fisherman. He gets into a boat, drags all the disciples with him, and they fish all night and catch nothing. A man on shore tells him to cast the nets on the right side of the boat. He does and catches 153 fish. Peter realizes the man is Jesus and they join him where Jesus gives Peter the "Do you Love Me? then feed my sheep." speech.

Peter, not knowing what God wanted from him, tried to go back to where he was comfortable. God gave him the exact situation, with the exact results, to show him that going back was not an option. As much as we want the "Good old times." It is not going to happen, God has changed us, we can't go back. The point is God has changed us from who we used to be to be to now a new person and we can't go back to be what we were before God came to us. No, it is never going to be the same, we are changed now.

We are not the same church we were pre-COVID. God has changed us. He has set us on new pathways and us doing the same behaviors we have done in the past are not going to work. We cannot go back to Egypt. God wants us to follow Him and let Him show us His ways ad we will be blessed.
