#### Words from Pastor

#### What is my pastoral approach to politics?

All forms of media have been filled with intense political rhetoric. These media forms do their best to speak directly to you. They will post, speak, advertise, and do anything else that might drive you to their page and bring you to "smash that 'like' button," as the kids say today. But what about the church? What is my pastoral duty when it comes to politics? How am I supposed to navigate and lead you through this political age?

In 1st Corinthians chapter I, Saint Paul asks,

"Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God." (I Corinthians 1:20-24 ESV)

He continues in Chapter 2, "For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified." (I Corinthians 2:2 ESV)

Saint Paul makes it clear that the role of the pastor and the church is to proclaim Christ and him crucified. So that is what I do and intend to do. I will not tell you whom I vote for or why I vote for them, but I can tell you the reason why I vote at all is because it is my civic and duty and therefore my Christian duty (Romans 13). In the pulpit, it is not my pastoral duty to make sure that you align with me or one another in any political way. It is my pastoral duty to see to it that you know Christ and him crucified.

Yes, I am deeply saddened by the events have transpired and continue to transpire in our nation. The only salve that we have to soothe the pain that these atrocities have caused is not political rhetoric, but Jesus. It is Jesus alone who raises the dead. It is Jesus alone who sets the captive free. It is Jesus alone who demonstrates, proclaims, and teaches true love. It is Jesus alone who empowers you by his Holy Spirit to love as he first loved us. It is Jesus Christ alone and he was crucified, died, and raised to redeem you from the death and decay of this world.

Since you are redeemed, you now are the nurses whom God sends out into this world to apply the healing salve of the Gospel on those who are deeply in pain. It is the Gospel by which God calls sinners into His Kingdom. We confess with one another that we believe in the Holy Spirit. We say with Martin Luther "What does this mean? It means that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ my Lord, or come to him. But that the Holy Spirit calls me by the Gospel, enlightens me with his gifts, sanctified and kept me in the one true faith." (Luther's Small Catechism Article 3) Therefore, as we go out into this politically divided world, we do not need to further divide by spreading political rhetoric, but instead we apply the healing salve of the Gospel so that the Holy Spirit call and sanctify this world. Thereby, he will make it holy and establish peace.

So if you expect me to take a political stand, I will not. If I am preaching God's word and it sounds like I am making a political point, please know that it was not my intention to do so. It is only my intention to proclaim the Word of God. If God's Word aligns or contradicts your political point of view so be it. It is my job and calling to proclaim God's Word and administer His sacraments. I will do so to the best of my abilities with the Help of God.

I say all of this because I deeply love you all. I know it is increasingly hard to proclaim God's Word without sounding like I am avoiding the political climate or that I am taking a side. It is becoming increasingly hard to prepare a sermon that may not offend. This is my burden and my struggle. Perhaps it is my cross to bare. And I will gladly bare it for the sake of the Gospel and the faith by which you are saved. I am happy to be crucified for proclaiming God's Word rightly. I will gladly do this for God and you, whom I love, both dearly.

#### "Seeds of Faith Around the Campfire"

Last month, our Family Ministry hosted a simple evening of fellowship: a campfire, s'mores, hot dogs, and an open playground. We didn't plan a big program or schedule—it was just an open invitation to come, eat, laugh, and be together. And yet, as often happens when God's people gather, the Lord did something far greater than we could have organized.

The weather was perfect—clear skies, cool air, and a cozy fire to gather around. But the true beauty of the evening wasn't in the setting, it was in the connections that happened. We had one of our oldest members in attendance, as well as one of our youngest, and every generation in between. Parents were able to share with one another some of the struggles they've been carrying and receive encouragement. Teenagers—who might otherwise be tempted to sit off by themselves—were playing tag and swinging with the little ones, showing them the joy of being cared for and included. Friends and neighbors were invited, and new faces joined us, turning a simple night into a living picture of evangelism as people encountered God's family in action.

The moment that will stay with me most, though, came when a child asked if they could be baptized at Calvary. For years, I have told even the youngest preschoolers that baptism is the most important thing we do as a church. To now see those words take root in the heart of a child, growing into a desire to receive God's promises, is humbling and joy-filled. We are taking steps to make this baptism a reality, and I am reminded once again of how the Spirit moves in ways we don't always see coming.

This campfire night taught me something I deeply need to remember: while I love teaching theology to our middle schoolers and sharing God's love in chapel with our little ones, and even sharing the gospel via our social media—sometimes the most powerful ministry happens in the ordinary. A shared story around a fire. A conversation between generations. A child swinging next to a teenager. A neighbor who feels welcome. A heart stirred to faith by the Holy Spirit

It is in these simple, beautiful moments that seeds are planted—seeds that will grow, not because of our effort, but because of the Holy Spirit. God's presence in these ordinary spaces is a miracle, and it is a line to without



# Elder's Corner

October is my birthday month, but just barely! Per my birth certificate, my arrival was all of five minutes into the month. Over my many years and many birthdays [suffice it to say that I am a war baby, as in WWII] I have become accustomed to the fact that when your birthday falls on the first day of the month you can expect many of the greetings you receive to arrive late.

As my birthday approaches it comes to mind that time is implacable. Time never stands still and cannot be stopped. My grandmother's favorite aphorism was "Too soon old, too late smart." Psalm 90:12 prays "So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom." How few are our days and how much we need to turn to God for security and refuge in this fallen world!

Contemporary culture continues to celebrate youth. Many want to stop the clock and so dye their hair, get a face lift, etc. in an attempt to do so. But even though they might stop the clock, they are powerless to stop time; how quickly it goes!

I recall discussing time with a now sainted Calvary member and we agreed on this paradox of time: how can the days go by so slowly and the years go by so fast??

Time leads us all into eternity – whether we like it or not. Jesus in His sermon on the mount states in Matthew 7:13,14: "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few." Luther's commentary on this passage states: "The true disciples remain on the hard path and enter through the narrow gate, namely the Word of God, saying: I am helpless. May God help me. It all rests in His hands." The frailty of our life on earth stands in stark contrast to God's eternal strength.

So the question each of us must ask him/herself is: which way am I taking? The path that leads to eternal bliss or the one that leads downward into eternal woe? That clock is clicking every day and no one can know for certain when their time on this earth will be over. Nevertheless, one can by faith in Jesus Christ be sure of his/her eternal destination. To that end I will close with some hymn excerpts, first from #761, Lutheran Service Book: "not the labors of my hands can fulfill Thy law's demands.... all for sin could not atone, Thou must save and Thou alone.... When mine eyelids close in death [and] I soar to worlds unknown, see Thee on Thy judgment throne, Rock of Ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in Thee." And from LSB #611: "Keep me in the narrow way, grace in time of need supply, while I live and when I die." May these hymn verses comfort all of us as we seek entry by the narrow gate Jesus has prepared for us.
